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## Advanced Placement Program Celebrates Record Gains

DENVER, CO – <u>The Colorado Education Initiative</u> (CEI) in partnership with the <u>National Math and Science Initiative</u> (NMSI) announced today a 73 percent increase in Advanced Placement\* (AP) scores for the 10 schools that began implementation of the Colorado Legacy Schools initiative in the 2013-2014 school year. The announcement came at a student assembly at Thomas Jefferson High School in Denver.

The Colorado Legacy Schools initiative works to dramatically increase student enrollment and success rates in AP math, science, and English courses at geographically and demographically diverse schools across the state – especially among underserved students.

"To date, the 23 participating high schools have doubled the number of students earning qualifying scores on AP exams, representing 1,200 new students succeeding in this coursework," said Yee-Ann Cho, The Colorado Education Initiative's Interim President and CEO.

Colorado Legacy Schools is a local replication of NMSI's proven College Readiness Program, which has an unparalleled record of closing achievement gaps and increasing college readiness in program schools. The initiative provides funding for extensive teacher training, student exam fees, classroom equipment and supplies, awards for those who excel, and extra time on task for students during Saturday study sessions.

"The AP teachers and students at Thomas Jefferson High School far exceeded our expectations last year. The students' 153 percent increase in qualifying math, science, and English AP scores represents one of the largest improvements in the entire state," said Gregg Fleisher, Chief Academic Officer for the National Math and Science Initiative. "Through our partner, The Colorado Education Initiative, we are proud to support Thomas Jefferson and the state of Colorado to ensure that more students have the opportunity to pursue majors and careers in STEM fields."

"The support from CEI gives Thomas Jefferson High School teachers the support to decipher the AP test so they can finetune instruction and give our students an edge when they're preparing to take an exam," said Thomas Jefferson High School Principal Suzanne Morris-Sherer. "Because of the grant, we're able to give students opportunities for extra tutoring to ensure they're ready for the test."

U.S. Department of Defense and Exxon Mobil Corporation provided initial funding for the Colorado Legacy Schools initiative. These investments led to CEI receiving the Investing in Innovation (i3) grant through the U.S. Department of Education. The grant allowed the program to expand this work throughout the nation.
